





Animals Impounded


FY08-09 Animal Intake data from city budgets

American Veterinary Medical Association Market Research formulas

US Census Bureau estimates 2.5 members per household

All Pet Owning Households =0.574 X Number of Households


Dog Owning Households = 0.372 X Number of Households Number of dogs= 0.632 X Number of dog owning Households

Cat Owning Households = 0.324 X Number of Household Number of Cats = 0.713 X Number of Cat owning households


Bird Owning Households = 0.039 X Number of Households Horse Owning Households = 0.018X Number of Households

From the American Pet Products Manufacturers Association 2002 survey:

The average amount spent on dog-related products was calculated to be \$420.

The average amount spent on cat related products was \$200.

This is separate from veterinarian expenses

556160 dogs X \$420 = \$233,587,200 627440 cats X \$200 = \$125,488,000 Total spent on pet products in Houston \$359,075,200

Thus, Houston pets directly contribute \$3,590,752 to the general fund through sales tax revenue of pet products

American Veterinary Medical Association Market research

The mean veterinary expenditure per household per year is

- ✓ \$356 for dogs
- ✓ \$190 for cats

AVMA Veterinary Expenditure estimate per household

\$356 X 327360 Houston dog owning households = **\$116,540,160**

\$190 X 285120 Houston cat owning households = **\$54,172,800**

Houstonians spend an estimated \$170,712,960 on veterinary services for their dogs and cats

From the American Pet Products Manufacturers Association 2002 survey:

12% of dog owners claimed they would surrender their dog to a shelter if they could no longer care for it. Lower income dog owners were more likely to surrender their dog to a shelter.

10% of cat owners claimed they would surrender their cat to a shelter if they could no longer care for it.
